URBAN AGRICULTURE AND COMMUNITY GARDEN SMALL GRANTS

For the first time in 2022, the Winnipeg Food Council offered a \$7,000 small grants program to support community gardens and urban agriculture initiatives.

The program was established in recognition of the Council-declared "Year of the Garden", and came from the Food Council's first ever operating budget. Applications were accepted for up to \$2,000 for new projects, garden renovations or operating costs. Organizations that are BIPOC led or represent equity-seeking groups were encouraged to apply.




The grant program was well received, drawing 56 applications, with a total ask of over \$97,000.

TOWARD A CITY OF WINNIPEG AGRICULTURE AND FOOD STRATEGY

The Winnipeg Food Council made significant progress in laying the groundwork for a Winnipeg Agriculture and Food Strategy in 2022. As per the committee's Terms of Reference, the Winnipeg Food Council is to "Initiate the development of and support the implementation, maintenance and evaluation of a City of Winnipeg Agricultural and Food Strategy to address municipal food security and food systems issues."

In 2022 the Winnipeg Food Council published a municipal food policy scan, a food strategy jurisdictional scan, and a Winnipeg Food System Snapshot Report. The municipal food policy scan identifies City of Winnipeg policies that influence or directly relate to the urban food system. It includes as policy various City strategies, by-laws, programs, best practices, pilot projects, and standard operating procedures. The food strategy jurisdictional scan summarized components of similar strategy documents from cities across Canada.

The Winnipeg Food System Snapshot report used key performance indicators to assess the urban food system across six sectors, including governance, sustainable diets & nutrition, social & economic equity, food production, food supply & distribution, and food waste. Working with a team of researchers, the research and policy committee of the Winnipeg Food Council produced several recommended actions for the next five years to support a sustainable and equitable urban food system. The immediate actions for the City of Winnipeg are to fund the development and implementation of an Agriculture and Food Strategy, and to adopt a city-wide residential food waste collection program.

GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE



In 2022 the Winnipeg Food Council built on previous years of work on green infrastructure and urban agriculture by establishing a dedicated Green Infrastructure Working Group. The working group examines how urban agriculture can be used to manage stormwater while providing various ecosystem services to communities across Winnipeg.

In early 2022 the working group helped draft a motion requesting the Winnipeg Public Service incorporate urban agriculture into one green infrastructure pilot project. In December, the Winnipeg Food Council welcomed the first report back from the Public Service on efforts to accomplish this goal.


Additionally, the working group is providing oversight to the 2022-2023 project with ProBono Students Canada, examining productive green roof infrastructure, by-laws and incentives in Canadian jurisdictions.

URBAN AGRICULTURE ON PUBLIC LANDS

In 2022 the Winnipeg Food Council proposed new policy parameters to allow for urban agriculture on public lands, in alignment with recommendations from the 2018 report Supporting Commercial Agricultural Uses in Winnipeg.

A new policy would allow for food grown on city lands to be sold under certain criteria, including that 1) the urban agriculture project be operated by a non-profit, that 2) proceeds of sale be reinvested in the project, and 3) that sales of produce take place in alignment with City zoning by-laws, including other criteria. The policy recommendation was also supported by research conducted by ProBono Students Canada for the Winnipeg Food Council over 2021 and 2022.

The recommendation was passed at Executive Policy Committee on September 14 and the Winnipeg Food Council looks forward to supporting the Public Service in operationalizing the policy in 2023.





AVOIDABLE HOUSEHOLD FOOD WASTE REDUCTION OUTREACH CAMPAIGN

In 2022 the Winnipeg Food Council worked with summer staff from the Winnipeg Public Service, and Love Food Hate Waste Canada to host an outreach campaign aimed at promoting tips and tricks to reduce food waste at home. The Public Service hosted booths at 12 farmers markets across Winnipeg from July 13 to September 7, and promoted the events via social media. In addition to providing information and materials to encourage food waste reduction, the campaign also included a raffle where entrants were asked to share a food waste tip to win a prize pack from Love Food Hate Waste Canada. The campaign drew 336 booth visitors, and 146 raffle entries.

The Winnipeg Food Council also promoted food waste reduction through two additional social media campaigns. Food Waste Action Week ran from March 7 to 13 and encouraged change by sharing the impact of food waste on the environment. From December 12 to 24 the Food Council ran a "12 Days Of Food Waste Tips" social media campaign, showcasing one tip each day over the holiday season. Tips ranged from meal planning and recipes, to food storage and ideas for using up leftovers.

CHOCHINOV PARK COMMUNITY GARDEN

In 2022 the Winnipeg Food Council continued to support and promote urban food production. In partnership with Councillor Devi Sharma, Seven Oaks Immigrant Services, Immigrant Centre, Seven Oaks Garden Club, and the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, the Food Council hosted a community barbeque in Chochinov Park on October 1.

The event was designed to engage community members interested in garden plots or in coordinating gardeners in the future. Over 40 community members attended to learn about the community garden.

The gardens at Chochinov Park are unique for a city park, as they are surrounded by fruit and berry trees and shrubs, planted by residents and community organizations over 15 years ago. Thus far, the plantings and gardens have been maintained by the Seven Oaks Garden Club, however the garden club is seeking new active members to take over operations. The Winnipeg Food Council, along with area partners, helped support community outreach for the Seven Oaks Garden Club in 2022.
